STEAM BOATS. In 1788 an Edinburgh Banker owned a pleasure boat propelled by steam driven paddles, with both paddles and engine on deck—the boiler being beneath the deck of the very small boat—with sail in case of a breakdown. The Comet was the first steamship to run on a regular route in 1812, at the mouth of the Clyde. It was not until the 1830's that steam was used to cross the Atlantic.

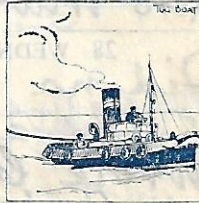

TUG BOATS II. As steam began to
replace sail, imperfect engines failed and
Tugs were used for salvage work. With
the development of large steamers the
Tug has become indispensable in helping
manoeuvre the liners into dock. Many
Tugs are needed to help launch the
modern liner. The River Clyde is so
narrow that a liner has to be guided and
turned by Tugs once she has taken the
water.

RIVER BOATS. These flat bottomed
boats are specially designed for the
shallower waters of the United States,
China and Africa. The enormous
paddle at the stern is characteristic. At
one time this was the only form of trans-
port around the Mississippi, Missouri,
and Ohio, and they had to be large
enough to carry a quantity of cargo and
passengers, yet be of sufficiently shallow
draft to navigate the swampy patches of
the rivers.
