WHALERS. Originally the whales were harpooned from small open boats, but with the invention of an explosive Harpoon gun by a Norwegian it became possible to harpoon the whale from the specially constructed forecastle head of the whaler. The whale is then inflated to keep it afloat and towed with others of the catch back to the mother ship.
